20th Annual Congress of the ESVD-ECVD; Chalkidiki, Greece, 8th–10th September 2005

The 20th Annual Congress of the ESVD-ECVD will take place at the Athos Palace-Pallini Beach hotel complex, located on the most beautiful beach of Cassandra, Chalkidiki from 8th to 10th of September 2005. The varied scientific programme will cover hot topics in veterinary dermatology including: important aspects of *Staphylococcus intermedius* colonisation and infection; canine allergies and aeroallergens; feline autoimmune alopecias; follicular diseases; keratinisation disorders; leishmaniosis; cutaneous inflammation; and feline eosinophilic dermatoses. Internationally recognised speakers will provide a continuing education programme of updates on exotic animal dermatology, diagnostic dilemmas in canine hypothyroidism, elimination diets, otitis externa, cytology, histopathology and other clinically relevant topics.

The Fifth World Congress of Veterinary Dermatology in Vienna

1000 delegates from 65 countries, 65 speakers, 300 exhibitors, and 35 companies: impressive numbers for an extraordinary event. WCVD5 was held from the 25th to the 28th of August 2004 in Vienna, in the Hofburg the former imperial residence. The four days were a unique opportunity for the 'Derma World' to meet each other. One week before the congress a press conference was held for previously uninformed journalists. This was the first time that WCVD has undertaken public relations and provided information and news for the media.

The pre-congress day was, as usual, devoted to Company Symposia (held by Bayer, Novartis and Royal Canin), a Resident's meeting organised by Ariane Neuber and Stefano Toma and an ISVD meeting.

The opening ceremony in the Imperial splendour of the Festsaal in the conference centre situated in the Hofburg, was not only a solemn occasion for Prof. David Lloyd to speak about the presence and the future of our specialised field, but was also an opportunity to pay tribute to Prof. Richard

Halliwell, who got the ECVD Lifetime Award in recognition of his excellent career and success as a scientist and teacher, and to Silvia Colombo, who was awarded the Uli Runge-Harms Award for the best European scientific paper by a resident.

The Scientific Programme

The scientific programme offered seven parallel series. The plenary sessions were structured into five topics: immunology, therapy, nutrition, skin biology and infectious and parasitic diseases. Supporting papers presenting the latest information by the world's leading authorities followed the five state of the art lectures. The free communications and poster sessions were another occasion to see, hear and read lots of interesting scientific news. The workshops, which had interactive presentations and discussions of the latest information on a specific topics in small groups, were a big success. For a non-specialised audience there were both comprehensive and advanced continuing education lectures, and a nurse and technicians programme.

The Veterinary Wound Healing Association and the ISVD were guests of the congress. Both groups held a series of interesting lectures and clinicopathological presentations. A number of other dermatological and other related societies had their meetings in conjunction with the congress.

Several new commercial developments in veterinary medicine and dermatology were to be discovered in the large and top class commercial exhibition. The principal sponsors Virbac, Royal Canin, Novartis and Bayer, who, with other 31 companies, participated in the well-organized exhibition.

The Congress Dances

The local committee (chair Otto Fischer) organised a sequence of unique evenings. It started with the Welcome Reception at the Major Hall, a wonderful neo-gothic room, with a superb polonaise performance on Wednesday, and continued with the Austrian evening, which had a large representation of traditional folk culture from Austria: a brass band, folk dance, milking race and lots of other activities. On Friday evening there was an amazing performance of the unique Lipizaner horses and riders at the Spanish Riding School. The last event was the Gala Dinner at the Schönbrunn (the summer residence of the emperors). Between each delicious course there were live performances of excerpts from Mozart's most famous operas: *Le Nozze di Figaro*, *Don Giovanni* and *Zauberflöte*. After dinner the Vetderms got the opportunity to show how well they could waltz and polka.

In all this was a very successful congress with a hugely impressive amount of presented scientific work and a magical atmosphere during the social events. A century ago Prof. Hugo Schindelka wrote the first Veterinary Dermatology textbook, and this meeting has brought 'big' Dermatology to Vienna once again.

Veterinary Dermatology news

Veterinary Dermatology is a bi-monthly, peer-reviewed, international journal which publishes papers on all aspects of the skin of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish. Clinical case reports, scientific research papers and reviews covering the diagnosis, treatment and control of skin disease, skin pharmacology, structure and function of skin, and the production of hides, skins and skin products, will all be considered.

The Journal is Indexed/Abstracted in Medline, Current Contents/Agriculture Biology and Environmental Sciences, Focus on: Veterinary Science & Medicine, Index Veterinarius, Small Animal Clinical Endocrinology, SciSearch, Research Alert and the Veterinary Bulletin.

In 2003, Veterinary Dermatology once more improved its impact factor rating – from 0.952 to 1.068. The Journal has also risen from 36th to 23rd rank in the Veterinary Sciences category. The number of pages increased in 2004, resulting in even better value for subscribers. In 2005, the Journal will have even more pages of reviews, original work and case reports, all peer reviewed.

Veterinary Dermatology, already an on-line publication, went live for on-line submissions on 24th December 2004. You can visit the site and register at <http://vetderm.edmgr.com>. The electronic system will provide faster communication between authors, the Journal and reviewers and decrease time to publication.

The system selected has facilities for checking figure quality and giving advice. It will, in time, even be able to automatically clean up references, not just styles (which are so tedious for authors) but also for correctness. Authors will be assisted with the production of their work and reviewer time will be saved by provision of instant on-line access to relevant papers. Conference abstracts and translations will be easier to input and there will be an integrated, seamless system from submission to publication or rejection if Journal standards are not met. This will decrease costs despite the cost to set up the system and fees charged to the Journal for every manuscript which goes through the review process.

Whether we like it or not, we live in an age of electronic communication. Although with open access to the web, there is a clear threat to traditional forms of communication, this is also a great opportunity. Just as the slide projector has disappeared from scientific meetings in as little as five years, within a similar future time period, all journals may have electronic systems in a vibrant new publishing environment.

I am delighted that there are now three Co-Editors to assist in progressing manuscripts; Dr David McEwan Jenkinson, who has had a distinguished career in the basic science of skin, and two Board certified clinical and research dermatologists, Dr Peter Hill and Professor Rosanna Marsella.

Systematic review to evaluate the efficacy treatments for atopic dermatitis in dogs

Dear Colleagues

I am writing to you as the secretary of the ESVD and ask for your assistance with the following project. You may well receive this request from other sources so I apologise at the outset for cross-postings. We are keen to make sure that all studies are included in this project.

The Cochrane collaboration is an international non-profit organisation that is the leading body for evidence-based medicine. This collaboration is subdivided into organ-specific groups, and it promotes the performance of systematic reviews for evaluating the efficacy and risk of interventions to treat human diseases.

We have been fortunate to have the interest of Prof Hywel Williams, from the University of Nottingham in England, who is the leader of the Cochrane Skin Group. Two years ago, Prof. Williams offered us to use the resources of his group (software, manuals, forms, editorial and statistical help) to perform a systematic review to evaluate the efficacy of interventions to treat atopic dermatitis in dogs. This is the first and only veterinary review hosted within the Cochrane collaboration, and we are grateful for this opportunity.

For this review, we designed an international team that is composed of: Thierry Olivry (Team Leader), Chris Chesney, Aiden Foster, Neil McEwan, Ralf Mueller, Hywell Williams, Zena Salmon (layperson, an atopic dog owner).

We followed the strict guidelines from the Cochrane collaboration and submitted a protocol. The protocol has been accepted recently, and it is available freely at:

http://www.cochrane.org/reviews/special/68canine_ad_protocol.pdf

At this time, we are selecting trials that will be scrutinized in our review. Our protocol calls not only for published trials, but also for those that have not been published. There is no language restriction. For identifying such unpublished studies, we need your help! We would be grateful if you could let us know if members of the ESVD ever completed, but did not publish, a clinical trial to evaluate the efficacy of any intervention (prevention, treatment) for atopic dermatitis in dogs. If the study was presented at a meeting, please email me (secretary@esvd.org) the abstract or fax it to +44 1694 720065. If the study was not presented anywhere, we would be grateful if you could email us a summary of study design, interventions, outcome measures and all patient data.

This systematic review is to be completed within 18 months. It will be posted on several websites and will be updated every 2 years.

Please pass any information to me by **30th June 2005**.

The International Society of Veterinary Dermatopathology (ISVD) is an organisation founded to further the recognition and educational development of veterinarians who have a professional interest in the histological interpretation of skin diseases of animals. Training of pathology and dermatology residents relies on the expertise of members who practice the discipline; and continuing and advanced training of other graduate veterinarians is provided through meetings, seminars and special courses.
